Team Flower Festival – 28-31 May 2010

However by the time you read this the promise of spring will be in the air. This means soon the merry month of May will be here, hooray! So I would like to share with you something about the forthcoming Team Flower Festival - how the idea evolved and the details of the festival itself.

At one of our planning meetings when our Readers, Tania (as team administrator) and clergy discuss cover of services, events etc, one person new to the team asked the question 'How does the team support a particular church when in need?' He was referring to the fabric issues facing St Peter and St Paul Wangford, and he was thinking of St Paul's vision in 1 Corinthians 12 of Christians supporting one another as the Body of Christ on earth and applying that to our particular situation and place.

Some of our team churches are very fortunate in that

individuals have bequeathed generous gifts to the upkeep of those churches. Others receive many generous visitors, such as Blythburgh, for which we are immensely grateful. The question therefore made me stop and think and soon the idea of a Team Flower Festival evolved. This we hope will be both an enjoyable team enterprise as we celebrate doing something creative as a team together and raise funds for Wangford church. We have flower display teams from all the churches inspired by the theme of the Suffolk Coastal Region. There will also be information available from various local interest groups including the Suffolk Coast and Heaths, the RSPB and the RNLI (Lifeboats)

We are so grateful to the display teams, however we need lots of other help also please! We need people to volunteer as stewards, providers of cakes and to serve refreshments. Soon rotas will appear in all our churches and we hope that people will sign

up to help in some way.

The Flower Festival opens 10am Friday 27th May until 8pm Monday 31st Refreshments will be served 10am – 4pm apart from the Sunday morning when we will be having the Team All-age Service with Archdeacon Judy at Blythburgh at 10.30am (followed by refreshments!). On the Sunday evening there will be a concert with the Amicci singers for which, no tickets are issued but instead the retiring offertory will go to Wangford church (for full details see the publicity which will soon appear).

On behalf of St Peter and St Paul Wangford may I thank you very much and we do hope you will be able to visit the displays (do invite your friends and families) and we look forward to seeing you there. May we each enjoy being part of the Body of Christ in our Sole Bay Team in this glorious part of Suffolk. Wishing you a happy Springtide!

WANGFORD with HENHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Council Meeting Dates: All monthly Council meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 8.00 p.m. in the Committee Room, Wangford Community Centre. Members of the public are always welcome to attend and are given an open forum at the start of the meeting.

February Meeting - At last month's meeting PC Sadler reported that there had been no crimes in the parish since the last meeting. During 2009 there were a total of 10 crimes. 22 crimes were reported in Henham, with 20 of these being related to the Latitude Festival. The County Councillors report confirmed that he would fund the purchase of a laptop and projector for the Council out of his Locality Budget. He had also bought a speed gun to be shared by two villages in the area. He asked if Wangford Council would like to part own and use this device. After consideration the Council decided not to accept. Cllr Goldson proposed using any leftover budget at the end of the year to purchase grit bins and the Council would like to be included, if sufficient funds allow. Under Matters Arising the Chairman had shown an interested party the spare garage

plot and explained what was involved and the cost. He had also attended a Henham Steam Rally directors meeting and expressed concerns over the flying of helicopters over houses during the annual event. The directors agreed that this would not be allowed to happen this year and they would be re-directed over the marshes and back, avoiding the houses. Under Reports a conditional offer of grant has been received from "Awards for All" to help refurbish the multi-games area. Tree stumps will also be removed around the perimeter as the roots are damaging the surface. The Council working party are meeting the website designer to review progress and comment of developments. There was nothing further to report on the lack of Post Office facilities in the village. The Chair had met members of the 56th Fighter Bomber Group who had asked for the Council to re-consider siting of the memorial. They want it re-positioned back on a brick plinth. Members of the public present said that there would be no cost to the Council for this work. However, they want the Council to retain responsibility for its upkeep and insurance. Councillors voted not to accept this responsibility. The Council

has made a formal application to adopt the BT telephone kiosk in the High Street and has received information that BT will now continue to pay the electricity costs of its adopted kiosks. It was reported that no-one has come forward to fill the Councillor vacancies on the Council. The usual items of Finance and correspondence were dealt with. The Chairman informed the meeting of Government proposals to withdraw exemptions allowed in village halls etc. from playing music licence fees. It was agreed to instigate a petition on the No 10 Downing Street website. Cllr Holland agreed to organise and the Council condemned this proposal, the views of which will be conveyed to John Gummer, MP. Under Planning two approvals were recommend for internal alterations to Elms Farm and conversion of a barn to one holiday let at Little Barn, Wangford Farm Barns. No decisions had been received from Waveney on outstanding applications. The minutes for the extraordinary meeting held on the 4th January were approved. The meeting closed at 9.05 p.m. The next meeting will be on the 9th February in Wangford Community Centre.

ABRAHAM WRITES:

Many images conjure up our perceptions of this green and pleasant land's villages. The church and rectory; the small school; the public house; the 'big' house. Much has either gone or has lost its original purpose but one which has remained, albeit in many cases drastically diminished is the Village Green. What could be more evocative of 'Olde England' than such a sight? Sitting on a bench on a balmy summer evening watching the sun go down and the world go by under an East Anglian sky. Glory indeed.

Common lands and Greens are survivals of agricultural systems and land uses. Ancient usurpers evolved a method of employing vast tracts of land for growing purposes while animals were permitted to graze

on common lands within easy reach of the village settlements. Many of the villages comprised clusters of houses grouped round a central clearing. This area was used for various and varying purposes such as discussion of matters of community interest and the protection of animals, the aged and the young. As the external lands were cleared these spaces were left alone and became what we now know as 'village greens'. They were, and still are, of different shapes and sizes, many having been eroded over time by surreptitious encroachment. A pond on a green would have been an important asset most probably providing a watering hole for livestock. Some have trees which help to enhance the sense of enclosure while those with none afford the surrounding cottages with an unparalleled view and would have been ideal for supervising the children and animals using it. Markets would have taken place and so, alas, in less enlightened times, would have punishment, in the form of the lock-up, the stocks and dreaded whipping post. Typical sights today include the war memorial, an obsolete water pump and public benches although many will be modern additions. But precious nonetheless, for even village greens must progress and other uses have to be found. Their mere survival is sufficient in my view to remind us of an age and way of life never to be seen again. Because of the pattern of the invaders such as the Anglo-Saxons you will find most of the greens in South East England and they are legion in our blessed County of Suffolk.

It is heartening and picturesque to witness a cricket match, the meeting of the hounds, Morris dancing, fairs, even rock concerts.

Our little village does not have a 'green' as such. Did it ever? Doubtful, because it would likely have survived in some form or another. One of my favourites is that of Westleton. Still of a rustic rather than domesticated appearance and used for village events. And who can fail to be moved by the living memorial of 'eighteen lime trees for eighteen men' proudly overlooking the pond?

And don't forget to talk to the ducks.
