Wangford 850 raises £6,500 for the Church Roof Appeal

On Saturday, the large crowd who enjoyed Wangford's "credit-munching" Harvest Supper, and the first performance of the Wangford Pageant, written by Jill Merry for the 850 celebrations of the village, also learned that the hugely enjoyable 850 Celebration over the August Bank Holiday had raised the

magnificent sum of £6,500 for the Wangford Church Roof Appeal.

The jumbo cheque was presented by treasurer Rachel Dade to Lady Penelope Gilbey, patron and churchwarden, and David Eaton, joint vicar.

This great achievement was only possible with the support and commitment of the whole

village community, friends in neighbouring villages and towns, and others from much further afield.

The Wangford 850 celebrations end in November, with the planting of a special commemorative tree in Millfields, Wangford, by the Wangford and District Horticultural Society supported by the 850 Committee.

WANGFORD CHURCH SERVICES

November is a busy month for Wangford Church, with a number of important 'big' services. Rev'd Julie's family service is usually held in the Community Centre at 9.30 a.m. However, on Sunday 1st November it will be a combined service at Southwold St. Edmunds Hall, joining with Southwold and Reydon. Julie will be joined by Caroline Hallett, the new Reydon Vicar Rich Henderson and the lively Meldrum youth helper duo. At 6.00 pm. in Wangford Church the annual Service of Light will be attended by Geoffrey Munn (of Antique Roadshow fame) who will address the congregation. This Service, if any, is the

one to come to. The church is full of lit candles and looks splendid, even in its current sad state of repair. The service is organised each year by the Church's Patron Lady Penelope Gilbey whose Grand-daughter will again sing. On the next Sunday the 8th, the Remembrance Service will be held in the church. This starts at 10.50 a.m. inside before the congregation move outside to the War Memorial for the two minute silence, last post, reading of names and prayers. The service then continues back inside the church, which is often colder than outside! The service on the 22nd will be led by the new team vicar of Reydon Rev'd Rich Henderson and will be at the

usual time of 11.00 a.m.. A good time to come and meet this new very friendly team member, who has recently moved to Reydon from nearby Beccles Church, where he was the very popular Curate. The last service of the month on the 29th will be a joint Common Worship Eucharist (modern service) joined with Blythburgh, Walberswick and Reydon, at Reydon church. This is at the earlier time of 9.30 a.m., conducted by Rev'ds Rich Henderson, David and Julie Eaton. This is the 1st Sunday of Advent and the first candle will be lit as Christmas draws near very quickly! All will be made most welcome at all of the services, many of which will have refreshments served during or after the service.

Harvest Festival weekend at Wangford

I don't suppose anyone realised how much Thespian talent we have in Wangford. The pageant of the history of Wangford which took us from cave men (so well acted by Rod!) to the present day was brilliantly staged during the harvest supper in the community centre on 3 Oct.

As we all know, our village is 850 years old this year and it was to celebrate this that the pageant was researched and written by Jill Merry. Very many people are due thanks for a wonderful evening: the costumes (Belinda and Linda), sound effects and lighting (Nick), stage management and production (Ginny and Derek), backstage helpers (Karen and Rosemary), Rod (fantastic special effects and acquirer of props), director (Sidi) and the script writer and producer (Jill) and a terrific cast of actors from the village - some of whom took multiple parts in their stride!

English Heritage update

Our application to English Heritage for a grant for our church roof is making its way through the sifting process. The recent site visit by English Heritage to Wangford went well but we know there are more worthy churches that need funding than monies available and some churches will inevitably be disappointed. English Heritage did though comment very favourably on the application that we submitted and in particular the DVD that Steve and Jess Smith put together. We hope to hear a decision from English Heritage before Christmas.

Our harvest meal was so efficiently laid on by Gill, Steve and Jess with help from Mike and Jean, the bar didn't run dry (thank you Mike and Jill). Our supper raised over £600. At the end of the evening the Wangford 850 Committee presented Lady Penelope on behalf of the PCC of Wangford with a cheque for £6,500 from the 850 celebration weekend in August.

This is an astonishing amount from the 850 weekend and the PCC (who are entrusted with the care of the church) is enormously grateful for such practical support from the village. Our church does not belong to any one group or individual (except perhaps the Almighty!) and it exists as a sign of God's presence amongst us and a place where each of us, of much faith or little faith, can turn whenever we choose or are in need.

But God is never constrained by buildings or structures and

we can each experience Him in the love and service we both give and receive, as our village has demonstrated down the years. May we continue to each play our part to share His love in our own generation and to pass on our faith to our youngsters and all who will follow us.

Our harvest festival weekend culminated in our harvest service in church on the Sunday which was well attended and involved a number of villagers bringing up harvest gifts to represent the blessings we all receive at the Lord's hand.

A very big and sincere thank you from your vicars to everyone mentioned, to the Community Council and Parish Councillors and the many not mentioned by name but who together enable our village to be the cracking place it is.

The New Local Government Network thinktank are looking for support from some of the country's landowners to lease out underused land to encourage people to grow crops i.e. allotments on private land. NOTES BY REVD JULIE EATON

from the Eulogy given at the Thanksgiving for Barbara Bryson

Barbara was born in Radcliff, Lancashire in 1932; she was the eldest of two children. She grew up in Lancashire and attended St Thomas Church of England School and the Strand Grammar School for girls in Whitefield.

Barbara worked for ICI as a shorthand typist, and she met Norman at the local Youth Club. Norman tells me that Barbara "Waylaid him! She pursued me and she walked me home." Well thank God she did for they enjoyed fifty-five years of marriage and the gifts of two children; Fiona and Doug.

Later in Barbara's career she became secretary to the Managing Director of Mather & Platt and then later still, she worked for The Countryside Commission as a secretary at first, and then was promoted to become the Campaign Manager for Groundwork UK, which was an agency for bringing the countryside into town and urban areas. She was passionate about this work and about involving schoolchildren with nature, plant life and the environment; all things she loved.

On reaching sixty-five years Barbara retired and within seven months she and Norman had moved to Wangford – and they never looked back. Barbara loved this part of Suffolk and enjoyed working for the National Trust at Dunwich; helping with pond-dipping and coastal erosion issues.

Some of you are well aware that Barbara was an avid reader and you may have seen the piles of books in Norman and

Barbara's home. She was a wonderfully inspiring member of our Wangford Book-club, which is where I first met her. Gill (Smith) had very kindly invited me to the book-club when David and I arrived in Wangford. Gill had told me this would be one good way to meet some parishioners. This turned out to be correct as I met some great characters, not just in the books! And Barbara was one of them.

She also loved her garden as many of you know, and she recently took David (Eaton) by the hand on a tour of her garden, explaining the plant names with pride.

Barbara loved Norman and their family very much and she spoke of them all with pride. She will be greatly missed therefore as a dear wife, mother, and grandmother. She

will also be sorely missed as a good friend to many of us.

As a person, Barbara was a no-nonsense, down-to-earth lady with great integrity. She was a very intelligent woman who lived out her convictions, and she was also non-judgemental and compassionate; two lovely qualities which often go together and which made her a wise friend. She also loved observing people; she called it "ear-wiggling"! Norman and Barbara were a great couple, and popular friends to many within the village.

The family would like people to treasure their own memories of Barbara. They feel she would be amazed and delighted at how many folk attended the thanksgiving.

Barbara had left instructions for her wishes for the thanksgiving service, and, with

those she had written a little passage or reflection:

There is a belief that we all die twice;
Once in the normal way
And the second time when the last person
Who really knew us dies; so
one's living memory is gone
from the Earth.

I would want to add to that to say that we are never forgotten, for God is outside of time and holds us eternally in his love (Psalm 139). The resurrection teaches us that our continuity is not dependent on human memory, but on God's love shown in his Son our risen Lord.

We do indeed give thanks for Barbara, we will miss her and our prayers are with Norman, Fiona and Doug and the family. May Barbara rest in peace and rise in glory.

And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Hebrews 12:1-2 TNIV

The 'great cloud of witnesses', are our inspiration to persevere in what we believe to be true and good and noble, especially when things get tough for us.
