# SOUTH COVE 2009 Nine Day Summer Flower Festival

Saturday 25th July ~ Sunday 2nd August

**A**part from one or two wet mornings, the weather was very kind during the whole of the flower festival.

We averaged about 150 visitors a day, lots of friends from the surrounding communities. Visitors on their annual holidays who come every year, and lots more first time visitors came to look at this year's flower festival, with the theme 'Holiday Snapshots'

South Cove has miraculously attracted over 50 people to help and support South Cove churches summer festival.. A team of 15 gifted flower arrangers. 35 more, who have variously become involved in stewarding the event, daily making cakes, serving morning coffee and afternoon teas and full cream dairy farm ice cream; and parting with and donating their 'treasures' for sale outside in the church car park in the marquees throughout the festival..

Again the goods gifted were excellent quality. Friends variously donated a Victorian Pembroke Drop Leaf Table, complete with its purchase receipt in 1996 for £365; a nearly new ladies 21 gear

bicycle, a large collection of framed and glazed early posters, three antique Rosewood occasional balloon backed chairs, a mahogany sideboard and matching chest of six drawers, Wedgwood china, lead crystal glasses, silver plate, cameras, clocks, a dinghy and oars, Parker Knoll, oak, teak, mahogany and country furniture, a revolving book case, fishing rods, collectables ~ matchbox vehicles, toys including wind up musical dolls, wood carvings, brand new electrical items from standard lamps to strimmers. And with the sale of books and original water colour paintings the team of five running these sales made nearly £2,000 (£1999: 45p).. Donations during the festival amounted to £1000 (£1000 : 91) and those serving refreshments raised over £1,100 (£1128 : 98).

We had some surprising sudden influxes of people. On Tuesday morning 40 walkers arrived for refreshments. And; bearing in mind South Cove Church is only designed to seat 70 people; on Friday morning two coaches drew up outside and over 90 people walked down the path into the

church.. The monies received during the South Cove Flower Festival totaling over £4,000 (£4,129).. This total reflects the free giving generosity and support, and its success through those that kindly advertised the event in their church porches, thought the local magazines, newsletters and announcements in the notices in church.

We gratefully thank all who made this possible. The flower arrangers, the stewards in the church, those manning the stalls, the Clergy and Readers.. For Simon Forder who prepared the churchyard and car park, for John Strachan of Church Farm, South Cove, for providing the equipment ~ For Alice and Dr Andrew Eastaugh who maintain oversight of the church throughout the year. For Colette Strachan for her home made ice cream. For all of you who contributed so many fantastic home made cakes, and shared your time and talents.

Now we look forward to welcoming our new Archdeacon Judith Hunt in October.

" find their climax in another favorite hymn that asserts that whatever happens we can proclaim "Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father.... thou changest not, thy compassions they fail not, as thou has been, thou for ever wilt be".

## PUBLIC FORUM

Residents from High Street, who had moved into their home in April informed Council of rats in their garden, which backs onto the allotments. The Chairman informed them that the Council pays for regular pest control. The residents explained that there is some tarpaulin on the allotment site close to their boundary, which is where the rats seem to come from. Cllr Ryland to talk to allotment holder concerned.

**C CLLR REPORT** – Cllr Goldson stated that he had two concerns in Wangford – the A12 junction and the junction of Church Street and Norwich Road, and that he would be meeting with Highways Engineers again. Cllrs asked him to also mention the need for a speed limit on Wangford Road near Reydon Hall and its cottages, and the footpath from the bottom of High Street along the A12 towards the Old School.

**POLICE REPORT** – PCSO Irvine reported that there had been 2 crimes in the previous

month; 1 drink/driving offence and 1 theft of a sign outside the Plough public house. There had also been 1 domestic incident. He agreed there were a lot of issues with speeding traffic, and informed Council that the Southwold SNT are trying to obtain a speed gun solely for themselves, which, after proper training, would mean all officers there could utilise this piece of equipment against speeding drivers.

**4 MINUTES** – The minutes of the meeting held on 9th June had been circulated, and were approved as a true record, proposed Cllr Smith, seconded Cllr Mrs Farrands, all in favour. The minutes of the Planning Meeting, held on 2nd July were also considered, and approved, proposed Cllr Smith, seconded Cllr Mrs Farrands, all in favour. The Chairman duly signed both sets of minutes.

## 5 REPORTS –

a) Planning Meeting, 2nd July – the Chairman reported that two planning matters had been dealt with at this meeting, as follows :-

i) Little Priory, Church Street – the developers had been present while Cllrs examined the plans and read the design and access statement. This statement was considered to be in a somewhat sarcastic vein, which the developers said reflected how they felt about this project. Council agreed to recommend Refusal on the grounds of over-development. The Chairman had prepared a statement that had been sent to the recent Planning Inspectorate Appeal re this site, which was circulated to Cllrs, and a copy of which is attached to the planning application papers. Clerk to write to WDC re removal of rubble etc from site.

ii) Cart Shed, Skinner's Cottage – The Chairman had consulted WDC as to the village envelope in respect of this application. Ian Robertson had stated that WDC would allow this application as it would be unseen from the road. The Council agreed to recommend Acceptance.

b) Allotments – The Clerk informed Council that there are 4 names on the waiting list for allotments. There are

two allotments still not under cultivation. Attempts to contact these two tenants had been made, and one, the holder of a half plot says he intends to use the allotment still. The other tenant cannot be contacted, and appears to have moved away. This plot, C8, is a ¾ sized plot. After consideration, it was agreed to write to these two allotment holders requiring that they put their allotments in good order within one month or the Council will re-allocate them to people from the waiting list. Clerk to write.

c) Play Equipment, Toddlers Play Area – a current catalogue from the original manufacturers of the broken piece of equipment, Playdale, had been obtained, and it was noted that the replacement price is currently £1,254. Clerk to investigate making an insurance claim.

d) ANY OTHER COUNCILLOR REPORTS – there were none.

**CO-OPTION** – Mrs Holland having arrived at the meeting at 8.15pm, having been delayed, and her co-option having been agreed by a majority vote (item 5 of these minutes) in her absence, she duly signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office, and joined the meeting as Councillor.
