AUGUST'S TEAM LETTER

Dear friends,

Firstly I wish to thank everyone who has made us feel welcome. We have received many kind messages of welcome and we are very grateful. We have been looking forward to our arrival in the team, and it is good to be here with you all. I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself as the new Team Rector.

I come to Sole Bay with my family. My wife is Irene, and we have three children. Thomas is almost 20, and he is just starting at Manchester University reading History. William is 17, and he is finishing his A level studies at Framlingham College, and Hilary is almost 10, and she is about to start at Halesworth Middle School.

We come to Sole Bay after having spent most of the past 25 years in West Yorkshire. I was ordained priest in 2002, so I have not been in ordained ministry very long. Prior to our arrival in Suffolk I have been the priest in charge of two towns in the "Heavy Woollen District" of the Spen Valley near Dewsbury. Heckmondwike & Liversedge are both former textile and engineering towns where carpets, blankets and worsteds

were made in large quantities until quite recently. During our time in Heckmondwike the last major mill lost most of its work making carpets for cars, following the collapse of Rover Cars.

So the environment in which we have been working, and in which our children have grown up, is rather different from Sole Bay. We are very excited about the change of environment, whilst hoping that what we have been part of will provide valuable experience for all that lies ahead.

My own childhood was spent in Framlingham, so I am not a total stranger to East Suffolk, and one of my closest school friends lived in Reydon! On leaving school and University I became a manager on British Rail. After a few years in Bury St Edmunds most of my railway experience was spent in Huddersfield, Leeds and Manchester. I spent my last few years before going to theological college in Norwich, working for Anglia Railways. We have always maintained close links with family and friends in East Anglia, and it is wonderful that we have been blessed with an opportunity of working with you all for the

sake of the kingdom, in this part of the world.

In ministry I have come to understand that every church has its own character and flavour, reflecting the members who make up the body of Christ in each place. We do not all have to try to be the same, or do the same things. I imagine that each of our team churches has its own character, and we can celebrate our differences, while supporting and encouraging each other. I heard about the recent flower festival at Blythburgh, and of how the whole team used this as an opportunity to support Wangford church. I thought this was a wonderful example of team work at its best.

As we get to know each other in the months ahead I hope that friendships will flourish. I pray that we will care for and support each other in all aspects of our Christian life. I pray that together we will live as witnesses to our faith, offering a welcome to all, and willing to make the sacrifices that will enable new life to grow to the glory of God.

Thank you all again for your generous welcome.
