SEPTEMBER'S TEAM LETTER

September has arrived and for David and me this will mean that we will shortly be moving to pastures new, but with great sadness. We will be leaving so many wonderful, kind and good people with whom we have shared deep fellowship, friendship and fun. During our time here we have greatly enjoyed being involved with so many church and community events: open days, country teas, flower festivals including the recent team festival, fetes, jumble or cake sales, seasonal meals and celebrations such as Harvest and Christmas, village celebrations, steam rallies and concerts.

We have loved being part of our four parishes and helping across the other four also, and being part of many team services. On our most busy Sundays we have between us taken eight or more services and events, so it is good that we enjoy driving in the Suffolk countryside in all weathers!

It has been an enormous privilege to be alongside people in church life and the wider community during various stages of life's journey, including for some as they approached the ending of their earthly life.

We are grateful to many for their generosity, inspiration, imparting of wisdom and hospitality. We have benefited from the ecumenical Lent Lectures and services together, and much valued the discussions in various study groups.

We greatly value our ecumenical colleagues who are such a source of encouragement especially over an Adnams at the Fraternal Meetings!

Five years ago we started a Family Service in Wangford Community Centre. The children were then very young.

It is a joy to worship with such a mixture of ages and it has been good to see the children grow into such lovely responsive and confident people. Our prayer will be that the children will know the deep and unfathomable love of Christ which sustains us throughout life.

Fabric Issues have been a feature in our time here; David and I have seen Sotherton re-roofed (and I loved having to conduct services outside during the roofing), then Blythburgh re-roofed, and soon we hope Wangford will be re-roofed. Uggheshall will no doubt need re-thatching at some point!

David has enjoyed serving the deanery as Deanery Organiser and has also been Acting Team Rector. Learning about agricultural issues and faith in the countryside have been a highlight for me and include beating the parish boundaries, blessing a plough and the crops, visiting cattle, and horses (of course!), celebrating a Eucharist on the bonnet of a car in a barn, watching in astonishment as a loose cow ran past my study window (a farmer in hot pursuit on his quad-bike), finding loose sheep at Henham, encountering all sorts of wildlife, and observing an exquisite owl hovering and hunting along the hedges at Sotherton.

During our five and a half years in the team we have worked with great colleagues. For the future, it is very reassuring for us to know that Sole Bay Team Ministry will be in such good and gifted hands; with the clear leadership of Simon (Pitcher) and Rich (Henderson), and the extremely able ministry team.

The team has now successfully reformed. It is now well-placed and ready to address questions of changes which affect all parishes especially in rural

England where stipendiary clergy numbers are reduced and the laity is discovering new patterns of mission and worship. Change can bring a sense of crisis to any organisation, but crisis can mean both danger and opportunity. In the Sole Bay Team there is so much potential for exciting times ahead.

David and I are not going far away and we hope to be able to visit the north Suffolk coast in the future; with time for swimming in the sea perhaps! All three of us – David, Tippi and Julie – will sorely miss you our many friends, and also the seaside and countryside. David loves Adnams too but thankfully he can stock up!

Thank you so very much indeed for all you have given to us and we wish you every blessing.

WANGFORD CHURCH ROOF UPDATE

We are now two-thirds of the way through our first year of managing the English Heritage grant award. Stage 1 investigations were completed in April and our architect, Alan Greening, has prepared the specification to go out to tender for contractors to provide estimates for carrying out the repair works. The investigations did reveal a problem with the buttresses at the Church tower, which are a health and safety issue and require immediate attention. Currently, Alan has applied to English Heritage for 'enhancement' of our grant offer and we very much hope that English Heritage will be able to come up with additional monies for these works.

Once the contractors have provided estimates for all the works, the PCC and Alan will need to get together to decide which estimate is the best for our needs and what items we must have and those items which we can do without.

English Heritage has a schedule

for dates at which it requires certain things to be done and we are slightly ahead of schedule which is good news. By 17th December we need to confirm to English Heritage that our works are viable and formally commit to stage 2 of the offer which is the actual funding for the repairs.

Thanks to the most inspirational and continuous fund-raising, the roof fund stood at £43,599.92, out of which we have paid £15,377.98, leaving a balance as at 31st July 2010 of £28,211.94. The monies paid out were for Cooper & Denny to carry out stage 1 investigations and other works, an asbestos survey, bat survey, structural engineer and our architect's fees. Stage 1 funding from English Heritage is £9,000, and we have already received £4,500 and will apply for the balance once we can 'sign off' the application.

We still await the outcome of our other grant applications and are hopeful that we will secure funding for the whole project. Part of our

funding will come from being able to reclaim VAT as the Church is a listed building. We need to raise a further £25,000 approximately but think it likely that our grant applications will be successful and we may get up to £15,000 which means we have to find another £10,000 (approximately) locally. We will continue to try other sources for funding and are still applying for grants where we think there may be a sympathetic response.

The PCC is so grateful to you all for your continued support and enthusiasm and we just need one extra push to get the remaining funding. We have a sub-committee of dedicated fund-raisers and if anyone can offer ideas or their time, do please contact Gill Rush on 578062

When the mighty snows come and we are blocked in, do we care when there is the farm shop, the surgery, the vets' practice, one of the finest village shops (how about that cheese selection), with the most charming and helpful of staff (I'll collect the bribe later, girls); not to mention the other life support machine - the Angel of mercy. But don't just rely on local services when absolutely necessary. Use them all the year round or lose them.
