MAY'S TEAM LETTER:

This week we have been taking Open the Book into our local Primary Schools, in order to present the Easter Story. Open the Book uses drama, mime, props, costume, even the children themselves to present Bible stories in a fun and engaging manner. This month we presented 'A Dreadful Day' which told of the events of Good Friday and then after a short pause for a moment of quiet, we presented 'A Happy Day' telling the story of the first Easter Morning.

It is always amazing in the schools to see how the children respond to hearing these stories which are so familiar to us. During A Dreadful Day you could have heard a pin drop in the school

halls. The children sat in silence as they heard about the crucifixion and even the moment of quiet, during which you can often hear the odd giggle, was silent. But then during A Happy Day, the mood lifted and you could see the smiles appear on their faces as they heard that Jesus was risen.

Being able to go into the schools and present the Bible stories is great fun. Open the Book every month serves as a reminder to me about how powerful the stories really are. They have been passed down from generation to generation and we have a responsibility to continue to pass them on to the next. As Psalm 78 reminds us:

we will tell the next generation
the praiseworthy deeds of the LORD,
his power, and the wonders he has done.
....so the next generation would know them,
even the children yet to be born,
and they in turn would tell their children.

This month, why not try re-reading some of the Bible stories with which we are all so familiar, perhaps too familiar? Sometimes we miss the wonder the children spot straight away. And as we read, may we start to recapture something of the excitement of Open the Book, so that in turn we may want to pass on the stories.

Even the open organ pipes have their own protective covering. And mostly hidden from view, the builders have begun the restoration of our church to its former glory.

A few years ago my mother made some elderflower wine. She was so excited that she opened her bottles and drank it without waiting long enough for the wine to properly mature. It tasted horrible, because she, encouraged by the whole family, acted in haste!

During May this year the church celebrates the season of Easter. Easter is not just one day, but a season of 40 days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, which this year falls on 2nd June. In the Bible a season of 40 days or

40 years occur, for example in the story of the Exodus, when the people of God travelled from Egypt to the Promised Land. Noah's Ark floated for 40 days and 40 nights. 40 is a symbol of completeness. It takes time to understand what belief in God might mean for us. It takes time in the Bible for great things to happen. Understanding the purposes of God requires time and patience, prayer and reflection. There are rarely instant answers.

Allowing ourselves time to think, to prepare and

to respond gives us an opportunity for wisdom and maturity. No one ever worked out the meaning of life the universe and everything in five minutes. The 40 days of Easter is a complete time to work out what the message of new, risen and different life might mean for each of us.

The following year my mother made some more elderberry wine, and this time patience was rewarded. We had bottles of delicious, fine tasting wine that were the fruit of mature waiting.
