## Remembering the Fallen

October 9th 2010



**A**s we in England commemorate the Battle of Britain and the immense bravery and sacrifice of "The Few", we should also remember that, later in the war, many of our allies also made the supreme sacrifice.

Pilots from the USAF base at Holton often flew over Wangford in training and on sorties, and, in February 1944, two young American pilots were killed in a bad-weather collision over the village. They were commemorated in a memorial set up at Pound

Corner in 2008; a fine brick plinth was constructed by Stephen and Trevor Clarke in 2010.

Through the good offices of Rod Tassinari and his Wangford Web, the niece of one of the pilots, 2nd Lt. Richard Albert, was able to explain to her 91-year-old father what had happened to his brother, and to visit Wangford and her uncle's grave in Cambridge.

The niece, Christine Albert, and her partner Chris Gage, are professional musicians,

and will visit Wangford on Saturday October 9th, during their European tour, to take part in a service of dedication of the memorial to 2nd Lt. Albert and his compatriot 2nd Lt. Philips. This will be at Pound Corner at 3.00pm, led by the Reverend Rich Henderson. Christine Albert will perform a song she has composed in memory of her uncle, called 'Wings of War'.

Later that evening Albert and Gage will perform a concert in Wangford Community Centre at 7.30 pm, supported by Pete Symonds and Lisa Ambrose. The proceeds of the concert will be divided between the Wangford Church Roof Appeal and Albert and Gage's own charities. Tickets are £7.50, and are available from the Village Store or from Rod at 8 Hill Road, Wangford.

There will be a licensed bar. Look up Albert and Gage on youtube to hear their style of music, and to preview the song "Wings of War".

The 21st Service of Light, when we rededicate the Wangford Church lighting and commemorate the lives of the fourth Earl and Countess of Stradbroke, will take place in the church at 6.00 p.m. on Sunday 31st October, 2010.

# OCTOBER'S TEAM LETTER

## The one who calls us is faithful

I find myself writing this article on the day that we have just said farewell to David and Julie Eaton. Thank you to all who gathered in Wangford Community Centre to say goodbye; special thanks to all those who helped setting up, serving drinks and clearing away! We can all continue to offer our prayers of thanks for David and Julie's ministry and for God's blessing on their future.

As David and Julie move on so do we, on our journey as God's pilgrim people in this place. Now the process begins to find the person who is being called by God to serve here in our team ministry.

# ABRAHAM WRITES:

As one travels on down what is euphemistically referred to as 'life's highway' do you find, as I do, that you are increasingly reminded of your own mortality? In childhood, death does not seem to be an issue and only extremely old people pass over, or so it seemed, some of us being sheltered in the early years from that particular fact.

Since we moved to this blessed plot I have attended at least ten funeral services and all the deceased have not by any means been older. The reason why this is to my forefront is that I had occasion to visit my little home village recently for the first time in, say, three or four years. And, leaving gaps of such length and, being of a certain vintage, there are inevitably going to be a few more black marks appearing. I ran into a couple of old chums in the local and I was told that another four acquaintances had passed over - Jim, who was slightly older, Wull, an old neighbour who at least lived until his late eighties, David, my age, and 'old Sandy'. Why I call him that I do not know since he was at Infants' School with me. As Mrs. Abraham so delightfully put it one day when I remarked that another old resurrected schoolmate was fat and looked much older than me: "Don't kid yourself on, chum".

Sandy and I grew up together pretty well until eleven years old. One of the rough and tumble games we used to get up to in the school playground

was to attempt to wrestle the third wee boy, Jimmy, to the ground, the rule being that Jimmy was not allowed to use his arms to resist. We never managed to beat him. (I wonder where he is now). When I left to go to the 'big school' Sandy and Jimmy and all the others stayed behind at the village primary, left at fifteen and entered the world of employment. My contact with Sandy through the next 50 years was very irregular. He worked on the land and then the building industry and, from what I was told, was a very skilled and industrious worker. When we started to visit the village in the 70's onwards I tried to see him from time to time, sometimes successfully. By that time he had opted out of society. His marriage had not been successful and he had taken to a life on the road. In the fine months he would sleep in the open and in the winter time, empty houses or barns. When he was desperate, usually around Christmas time, he was known to throw bricks through Police Station windows to obtain a warm cell for the night and, no doubt, a decent breakfast. When we did meet, we would pass the time of day pleasantly enough. He confided that he had spent some time in prison. At some point (he regaled) his fellow inmates were protesting about the standard of meals and had resorted to refusing to eat them. Sandy was tucking into lunch when another lad told him to stop, to which Sandy replied: "B\*\*\*\*\*r \*\*\*! "It's better than I used to get at

home". When his dad died he inherited the Council tenancy of his bungalow. This, alas, did not last long and Sandy was evicted for rent arrears.

Villagers tried to help, offering him jobs and helping him with accommodation, but the wandering life seemed to suit. Not that he let himself go - washing and shaving in public conveniences and confident that, if and when he fell, physically and metaphorically, someone would always be there to pick him up. I did it a couple of times.

One day we went for a long walk, a circular route round the hills beyond the village where we'd played so often. He 'grazed' pretty much all the way - an apple from a garden, wheat from the harvest, a drink from the ice cold gurgling stream, finishing off with a dessert of rhubarb from a derelict quarry. No doubt, a very healthy diet, supplemented with lager. He was simply the older little boy that I had known.

Alas, now passed. The net had caught him and he lived latterly in a Local Authority flat in a village some miles away. He was found dead inside, having been so for some time.

I did not know the violent, thieving, drunken Sandy. I only remember my little chum. I expect I'm feeling sorry for myself. I can accept losing my youth but when the things and people of my youth, considered indestructible, disappear also.....

# NEWS FROM SOUTH COVE FLOWER FESTIVAL

The weather was very kind during the whole of the flower festival. We averaged over 150 visitors a day; friends from the surrounding communities, visitors on their annual holidays who come every year, and lots more first-time visitors came to look at this year's flower festival, with it's theme 'Praise Through Colour'

We attracted over 50 people to help and support this year's summer festival: a team of 18 gifted flower arrangers, 3 dozen more volunteers, who over the 9 days became involved in making cakes, serving morning coffee and afternoon teas and home-made Suffolk Meadow dairy farm ice cream, stewarding the event, and

donating their 'treasures' for sale outside in the marquees.

Again the goods gifted were of excellent quality, and with the sale of books, the team of five took over £2,600. Donations during the festival amounted to nearly £1,500 (some 50% up on last year) and refreshments raised £1,400.

We had some surprising sudden influxes of people. On Tuesday morning some 50 walkers arrived for refreshments.

The monies received during the South Cove Flower Festival totalled £5,648.30p, over £1,500 up on the 2009 total of £4,123.

We thank all who made this possible. The flower arrangers,

the stewards in the church, those manning the stalls, the Clergy and Readers; for Simon Forder who prepared the churchyard and car park, for John Strachan of Church Farm, South Cove, for providing the equipment and cutting the hedges; for Alice and Dr Andrew Eastaugh who maintain oversight of the church throughout the year; for Colette Strachan for her home-made Suffolk Meadow ice cream; and for all of you who contributed so many fantastic home made cakes, and shared your time and talents.

# WANGFORD WITH HENHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Council Meeting Dates: All monthly Council meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 8.00 p.m. in the Committee Room, Wangford Community Centre. Members of the public are always welcome to attend and are given an open forum at the start of the meeting.

At the Public Forum of the August meeting, the Council deferred to the next agenda the matter of support for a speed limit on the B1126 between Wangford Hill and Reydon Church. District Councillors reported that work on merging with Suffolk

Coastal District Council, with a view to efficiency and savings, was continuing, with a joint website and exploration of joint working practices. PC Sadler reported just two crimes in Wangford since the last meeting. There had been 40 crimes in Henham associated with the Latitude Festival as compared to only 12 crimes in 2009.

Following complaints, procedures for the allocation of concessionary tickets for the Latitude Festival will be discussed at the next meeting. Problems with vegetation around the multi-games area

were to be dealt with in the next few months.

Both Councillor Blades and the chairman had had meetings with the Post Office where it was acknowledged that a resolution to the current situation was urgent. Therese Coffey, MP, had also contacted the CEO of the Post Office, who would contact the Council.

It was noted that the Council could not afford to ask for a judicial review in the matter of development at Little Priory, but it was agreed to monitor progress closely.

Suffolk Trading Standards have received a number of complaints about traders going door to door offering to buy antiques, jewellery and gold for cash on the doorstep.

We are warning anyone thinking of selling any of these items to think very carefully about whether a trader on the doorstep is going to offer them the best deal.

We advise that anyone thinking of selling any items should shop around and make sure that they are getting the best price possible for their goods. Traders who buy at the door, rather than sell are not required to provide cancellation rights. Consumers are urged not to feel pressured into selling anything they don't want to.
