Without fail every Friday Dougie would arrive with his push along mower to trim around the memorial which right up to his death was immaculately maintained. of arranging re-lettering etc, with his usual enthusiasm and dedication. We were very lucky to have Dougie's wisdom and local knowledge on the Parish Council for some 20 years or so. He rarely missed a meeting and was a missed when he stood down just a few years ago. His knowledge of the Council past and local area remains unsurpassed.

All of us should be indebted to Sally and the family for generously giving all donations received to the much needed Church Roof Fund. Money continued to be donated after Dougie's funeral and a fantastic sum of £1033.70 was presented to the Church Treasurer.

Easter People-Resurrection People

On Easter Sunday in our churches we will say the great Easter response-

"Christ is risen"
"He is risen indeed, Alleluia!"

And this Easter response will be said not only in our churches, but also in churches across our country and throughout the world. And as we say these words, we are making a very powerful statement.

And as we celebrate this Easter in Sole Bay, we are proclaiming the power of the risen Lord in our neighbourhood. Power to change both individual lives and our community life together as we bring the Easter message of hope ... hope of transformation. So often we are surrounded by bad news; problems in our close family, illness of loved ones and newspapers and television full of stories of financial ruin, of personal despair and of crime and violence. And it can be

easy to lose hope, "what is our world coming to!"

But, as St. Paul writes to the Corinthian church at the end of his great chapter that proclaims the bodily resurrection of Jesus that first Easter, "How we thank God, who gives us victory over sin and death through Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Corin. 15: 57). Christ has won the victory through his own death and resurrection. So, however bad the mess that we are in, whatever the situation, whether of our own making or because of someone else, there is still hope. We can be forgiven and have a fresh start. We can move on and find new life and freedom.

As Christians we are Easter people, living out the reality of the crucifixion and the resurrection in our own everyday lives. We know in our own experience that God brings new life out of the most hopeless situations.

One of the joys for me as a Priest is hearing people's stories of faith, the stories of what God is doing and how he is answering prayers and bringing hope and change. For all of us the process is not complete. It won't be until Jesus returns. But with the resurrection of Jesus the new creation has started and we know that one day we shall be united with Him in a resurrection like His, completely free from sin and death. And so we live as resurrection people now, working and praying for transformation, the righting of wrongs in our own lives and the lives of those around us, knowing that this work will be wonderfully complete in the final resurrection.

"Christ is risen!"

"He is risen indeed, Alleluia"

Book Club

At our March meeting, we discussed Sue Monk Kidd's 'The Secret Life of Bees'. There was not a dissenting voice amongst us and all agreed this was a superbly written book. Some of the comments were as follows, '...I've discovered that I like stories told from a child's perspective... deceptively simple but very powerful... Lily was strong and resourceful... I enjoyed the depiction of the religious ceremony of the "daughters"... I thought the information on bees was really interesting and didn't know bees had roles such as maternity bees, mortician bees and nursery bees... it was interesting that in America the bees' hives are covered with black cloth but they are not told of death in case they leave, whereas here the bees are covered with black cloth and told of a death to prevent them leaving... the image of Lily being forced to kneel on grits was cruel and prompted me to find out what grits are: raw oatmeal which swell on broken skin... some similarities to 'To Kill a Mockingbird' which was the only other book we've all agreed on... semi autobiographical as the author was a child in the 1960s deep south of America...'

WANGFORD CHURCH ROOF REPAIR - UPDATE

We are now well into our Stage one process of investigating the works required to the church. We were very grateful to all who turned up at the church on Saturday 6th March to help move the pews so access could be gained to the North Aisle. Particular thanks must go to Robin Chater for organising the move, Gerard Walker for supplying the transport and Ray Miller for storing the pews in his barn whilst works take place. The investigation works have now been completed under the expert direction of our Architect, Alan Greening. These investigations provided some good and bad news. The roof timbers beneath the lead are not in as bad a condition as anticipated and can be saved. However, the flint wall standing about the flat roof is in very poor condition and is perhaps the main reason for water running down the wall into the church and damaging the walls and windows. The whole of the large wall needs to be re-built. Whilst looking at the roof Alan has identified a serious structural defect with the tower. He thinks that the flint facing is too thin which is resulting in cracking. He feels that a large portion of this flint face could collapse and fall through the newly replaced lead roof. He is therefore anxious to repair it and has approached English Heritage for further assistance. In the meantime the area beneath in the church yard has been roped off and danger signs erected. Please do not go

near this area as this part could collapse at any time. Internally, the timber floor in the north aisle looks a lot worse than it is and on investigation only localized rot was found. It is thought that this floor can be saved with only local repair. The cost saving can then be re-directed to the more important areas outside.

Alan now prepares drawings and specifications with the knowledge gained from the onsite investigations. Once these have been submitted and approved by English Heritage he will obtain tenders for the repairs from three specialist builders.

In the mean time we must continue to raise funds as the English Heritage Grant only provides about 56% of the overall cost (assuming no unknown costs arise (they already have Asbestos Survey £300, Bat Survey £350 etc). We have to pay £2,500 from the money we've raised so far to this stage of the repair. We are seeking funds from other charitable sources and a number of events are planned in the village over the coming months. Please support these events where you can, we need every penny. By the 17th December 2010 we need to have enough funds in place to apply to English Heritage for funding to do the repairs. If we do not have the funds in place they will not grant the provisional funding for the Stage 2 repair. If you can help in any way, or are prepared to investigate other sources of funding please give me a call.
